GREC GRAN 201 Ancient Greek Intermediate I

Credits: 3

Course Description: This course aims at engaging students to familiarize them with the most important elements of ancient Greek grammar and syntax so as to help them use these as tools to unlock the texts and at informing them of the historical and cultural context of the material covered in class.

Rationale and Impact of Course: Placing emphasis on reading original Greek texts, the course gives students the opportunity to be in constant and creative contact with Greek antiquity. It is dedicated to connecting Greek antiquity to contemporary Greek reality and helping students explore the significance and continuing impact of this period on their modernity.

Learning Outcomes and Expected Student Competences:

- Familiarize students with the most important elements of ancient Greek grammar and syntax.
- Master the skills necessary to effectively read and interpret original ancient Greek texts.
- Learn to distinguish and nuance the similarities and differences between their own ideas and those encountered in texts from a completely different era.
- Learn to communicate their thoughts in a logical and well-ordered manner through ancient Greek language's structure.
- Understand the past in order to comprehend the present and look toward the future.
- Students will compare the multicultural societies they presently live in with those Greek antiquity.
- Sharpen their skills of social observation and analysis.

Course Requirements:

The course's required text is Lysias' *For the invalid* speech. All grammatical and syntactical issues will be discussed along with the reading of the speech. Students will be constantly and creatively instructed while attempting to translate an original Greek text.

Students are not required to buy any books for the course. All the material needed is handed out to students at the beginning of the course.

Assessment / Grading policy

- Participation is not just about talking, giving opinions or exercising critical capacities. It should also involve giving evidence of reading either the material assigned or other sources relevant to the subject matter.
