### STUDENT DEBT

Unlike consumer loans, student loans are an investment in your future and can pay big dividends (on average \$1 million more in lifetime earnings than those with a high school education). However, like all borrowing, it must be done wisely. Student debt is a serious problem for some students, but it has also been sensationalized by the media. Students who graduated from private 4-year nonprofit colleges and universities in Pennsylvania have an average debt level of \$32,833, while graduates of public 4-year colleges have an average debt of \$33,547. Average debt load for private college students may be lower because a larger percentage of students finish in four years and receive significant amounts of institutional aid. Students from Pennsylvania's private institutions also have a low average loan default rate of 4.8%.

### AVERAGE AMOUNT BORROWED by Undergraduate College Students in PA



## ACCESS & AFFORDABILITY

### **ACCESS & AFFORDABILITY**

Private college in Pennsylvania costs less and is more accessible than you think. On average, students who receive financial aid pay 60 percent less than published tuition rates. Net tuition and fees for students receiving aid has stayed constant over the past five years as private colleges have responded to stagnant family incomes. Net tuition reflects federal, state and institutional grant aid received. Private colleges have demonstrated their commitment to increasing access to low-income students by providing 74 percent of all grant dollars on average to their students.


PUBLISHED TUITION for full-time students during the 2014 academic year AVERAGE AMOUNT PAID by full-time students receiving aid during the 2014 academic year

### DISTRIBUTION OF LOW-INCOME STUDENTS by Educational Sector in Pennsylvania, 2014–15



### Average institutional GRANT AID to full-time, first-time undergraduates receiving institutional grant aid 2014–15





### GRADUATION RATES & DEGREES

Most students attending a private college or university in Pennsylvania graduate with a bachelor's degree within four years, keeping the cost of a degree down and allowing Pennsylvanians to begin their careers sooner. Private colleges and universities award almost one-half of the bachelor's degrees and more than two-thirds of the graduate degrees received by students in Pennsylvania. Nearly half of the bachelor's degrees granted to students in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) come from private colleges.


### GRADUATION RATES: 2009 Freshman Cohort Seeking Bachelor's Degrees



### WORKFORCE IMPROVEMENT

Sixty percent of future jobs in Pennsylvania will require postsecondary education. Private nonprofit colleges and universities are awarding the majority of the degrees to students entering high priority occupations. They also are educating working adults of all ages, enabling them to increase their knowledge and value in the workplace and to their communities and the Commonwealth.



### PA Private College and University Share of 4-Year Undergraduate ENROLLMENT BY AGE COHORT, Fall 2015




### DECLINING PHEAA FUNDING

Taxpayer funds used for higher education need to be spent wisely and efficiently. State funding for the PHEAA Student Grant Program, once one of the best programs in the country, has fallen in recent years. This trend must be reversed. Augmentations from PHEAA's earnings have increased, though not at the same level as the state disinvestment. State funds that previously supported need-based student aid for students in all sectors of higher education are now being diverted to other areas of the state budget. Consequently, low and moderate-income Pennsylvania students have lost significant purchasing power over the last decade. The maximum grant has not been fully funded since 2007–08 when the grant was \$4,700 per student. Now the grant is at 93% of what the formula should drive out, or \$4,378 per student. Reinvestment in the PHEAA Grant Program would help increase access to higher education and alleviate the student debt problem.

AICUP applauds the Ready to Succeed Scholarship (RTSS) program, established in 2015 to aid second-year and above students not fully supported by the State Grant Program and to mitigate student loan indebtedness. However, it was estimated that approximately 7,125 eligible students did not receive an award in 2015 due to insufficient funding. AICUP supports additional funds for RTSS and the Institutional Assistance Grants.

In 2014–2015, it cost the average Pennsylvania taxpayer \$2,213 per degree at a PA private college or university compared to \$17,147 per degree at a PA state-related or state system university.
