




STUDENT DEBT ... BUT COLLEGE PAYS

In Pennsylvania, private college graduates actually borrow less money than their public university counterparts. Average debt load for private college students may be lower because a larger percentage of students finish in four years and receive significant amounts of institutional aid. Students from Pennsylvania's private institutions also have a low average loan default rate of 4.8 percent.



ACCESS + AFFORDABILITY

Private college in Pennsylvania costs less and is more accessible than you think. On average, students who receive financial aid pay 63 percent less than published tuition rates. Net tuition and fees for students receiving aid has stayed constant over the past five years as private colleges have responded to stagnant family incomes. Net tuition reflects federal, state and institutional grant aid received. Private colleges have demonstrated their commitment to increasing access to low and middle-income students by providing 74 percent of all grant dollars on average to their students.




Percentage of Full-time, First-time Undergraduates Receiving Institutional Grant Aid 2015-16

GRADUATION RATES + DEGREES

Most students attending a private college or university in Pennsylvania graduate with a bachelor's degree within four years, keeping the cost of a degree down and allowing Pennsylvanians to begin their careers sooner. Private colleges and universities award almost one-half of the bachelor's degrees and two-thirds of the graduate degrees received by students in Pennsylvania. Nearly half of the bachelor's degrees granted to students in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) come from private colleges.


WORKFORCE IMPROVEMENT

Sixty percent of future jobs in Pennsylvania will require postsecondary education. Private nonprofit colleges and universities are awarding the majority of the degrees to students entering many high priority occupations. They also are educating working adults of all ages, enabling them to increase their knowledge and value in the workplace and to their communities and the Commonwealth.

Pennsylvania's private colleges and universities serve students from all family income levels and propel large percentages of lower and middle-income students into the highest economic quintile by their 30s.





PHEAA GRANTS + READY TO SUCCEED SCHOLARSHIPS (RTSS)

Taxpayer funds used for higher education need to be spent wisely and efficiently. State funding for the PHEAA Student Grant Program, once one of the best programs in the country, has fallen in recent years. This trend must be reversed. Augmentations from PHEAA's earnings have increased, though not at the same level as the state disinvestment. State funds that previously supported need-based student aid for students in all sectors of higher education are now being diverted to other areas of the state budget. Consequently, low and moderate-income Pennsylvania students have lost significant purchasing power over the last decade. The maximum grant has not been fully funded since 2007–08 when the grant was \$4,700 per student. Now the grant is at 92 percent of what the formula should drive out, or \$4,318 per student. Reinvestment in the PHEAA Grant Program would help increase access to higher education and alleviate the student debt problem.

AICUP applauds the Ready to Succeed Scholarship (RTSS) program, established in 2015 to aid second-year and above students not fully supported by the State Grant Program and to mitigate student loan indebtedness. However, it was estimated that approximately 6,707 eligible students did not receive an award in 2016 due to insufficient funding.




State Grant Funding

The State Grant appropriation declined by nearly 21% since 2013–14.




State Grant Purchasing Power

The average State Grant award purchasing power declined from 16.6% in 2013–14 to 14% in 2016–17. Without PHEAA's supplemental funding, the purchasing power would have declined from 13.6% in 2013–14 to 10.1% in 2016–17.



Pennsylvania & CPI Calculated State Grant Maximum Awards Per Award Year

In order for the State Grant Program's maximum award to maintain a steady purchasing power (relative to CPI), it would have had to increase from \$4,700 in 2007–08 to \$5,624 in 2017–18 (an increase of 19.65%).




STATE FUNDING + QUICK FACTS

It cost the average Pennsylvania taxpayer \$2,274 per degree at a PA private college or university compared to \$17,888 per degree at a PA state-related or state system university.
