
Ready, World Ready. It is with profound gratitude that I extend my appreciation for your partnership and deep commitment to Arcadia University.

Inspired to Create Change

Frank A. Daiutolo III '93 and his wife Pauline were members of the Holy Redeemer Fitness Center for several years. Over that time, friendships formed while volunteer opportunities became a natural way to make good use of time, especially after Pauline passed away. Still quite active, Frank was invited to serve in the fitness center, and he jumped at the chance, saying, “I couldn’t imagine just sitting around.”

Frank remembers how COVID enveloped the hospital, impacting parts of normal operations, including the fitness center: “Everything was shut down, and all the volunteers were restricted from the hospital. The hospital lobby and a section of the fitness center parking lot was converted to a COVID testing site.” As conditions improved, the fitness center reopened despite restrictions staying in place. However, as a member, Frank was able to return to his exercise schedule. It was also around that time that Frank began thinking about how he could be helpful to institutions that mattered to him.

About three months after the center reopened, Frank was again invited to return as a volunteer to work with COVID testing and spent 18 months doing so. By February 2023, with all restrictions lifted, Frank returned to his volunteering at the fitness center.

Perhaps mindful of the fragility of life or the importance of supporting college education, Frank made a bold decision to establish a new scholarship at Arcadia whose fruits he could bear witness to during his lifetime. “I want to see how the support makes a difference while I am here to actually see it.” By the late fall of 2024, *The Pauline and Frank A. Daiutolo III Endowed Scholarship in Computer Science* became the newest fund designed to help Arcadia students with the costs associated with their college education. The endowed scholarship, the first with an academic focus on computer science, will distribute its inaugural award in the Fall of 2026.

FORGING A LASTING INFLUENCE

OPPORTUNITIES TO GIVE: H.O.M.E. SCHOLARS PROGRAM

The **H.O.M.E. Scholars Program** directly supports students with foster care experience and others facing significant barriers by addressing well-documented risk factors that impact academic success, well-being, and long-term stability. Donor support eliminates a range of boundaries, which helps to prepare students to take on college.

Future Ready. Work Ready. And World Ready.

New as of August 2024, the **H.O.M.E. Scholars Program** is a multifaceted, wraparound model which addresses housing, finances, academics, leadership, life skills, and well-being. The outcome of our program is its ability to directly improve retention and completion for high-need students.



I was a social worker at one time in my life for 20 years who worked with youth in foster care. One of the hardest things was seeing the young people leave care and have nowhere to go and little or no support for their future. They have a safe residence on a lovely campus, they have meals, they are receiving an education that will give them the opportunity to grow and explore and find their way – to bloom. They have access to caring support to help them achieve and are making friends on this journey. I am so pleased and joyful to be able to support this program.

14.8% increase in First-year H.O.M.E Scholars' average term GPA (from 2.62 to 3.01) from Fall '24 to Spring '25.

100% of H.O.M.E. Scholars received year-round housing, removing a major persistence barrier.

100% of all first-year H.O.M.E. Scholars and 62.5% of all H.O.M.E. Scholars studied abroad; 87.5% engaged in off-campus enrichment and mentorship.

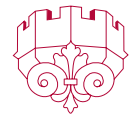


ANNOUNCING NEW

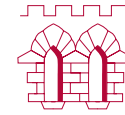

The tower offers various vantage points outside the Castle walls. Support allows for students to travel abroad, partake in internships, and be armed with job readiness when they leave the Glenside campus.

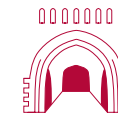


THE BAILEY

This entryway symbolically embodies two important journeys: one for donors, as they begin their legacy of giving, and another for students, as they embark on their path toward higher education and adulthood.

CULTIVATING A LASTING LEGACY

Kathleen “Katie” A. O’Connor O’Brien ’00 is a dedicated alumna—not solely measured by her volunteer work or twenty-four years of philanthropic support, sixteen of those years being consecutive – but also by establishing a legacy at Arcadia. Katie is from the Class of 2000; her sister, **Jennifer O’Connor Glaze ’02, ’07M**, soon followed in her footsteps and met her husband, **Thomas Glaze ’01**. Jennifer and Thomas’ son, **Matthew**, is a first-year student at Arcadia in the Class of 2029. Katie said the following when asked *why* Arcadia and *why* she continues to loyally support the institution that was the springboard to her success.

“I was initially attracted to Arcadia because of the smaller feel and its proximity to home. Arcadia quickly became family for many reasons. Administrators, such

as **President Bette Landman, Jan Walbert, and Jeff Ewing** were always visible, caring, and approachable, even before I enrolled as a student. In my Spring semester of my senior year, I stepped up to be an RA. The years of service spent on Resident Hall Council prepared me to take on this leadership position. I still look back at some of these events in my college career and am so grateful to Arcadia for supporting me in my growth into young adulthood.

After graduation, there was no doubt I wanted to stay connected to Arcadia. My sister and brother-in-law were still students as well. I served as a Recent Graduate Trustee and was an active

member of the Arcadia University Alumni Association. My parents always valued the importance of a good education and to always say thank you; I witnessed them donating to their own alma maters and supporting important causes. So naturally, I never gave a second thought about donating to the annual fund [*The Fund for Arcadia*] and any of the campaigns held throughout the year. It’s an opportunity for me to show my gratitude for my experience at Arcadia. I also want to give students the same opportunities I had benefitted from.”

Committed to Supporting Students' Well-Being



Donors who give at the Jones Poundstone Society level are more likely than any other donor cohort to share a vision of institutional sustainability and transformation. Such is the case with with **Joy Slabaugh '23M**.

Believing that wealth reaches its highest potential when it's aligned with purpose, Joy made her first major gift in FY25. For her, financial well-being isn't just about accumulation, it is also about using one's resources to create meaningful, lasting impact. When asked what motivated her philanthropy, Joy said, "This gift reflects my commitment to removing systemic barriers and expanding access to mental health care in a way that honors both legacy and equity."

"I established this endowed fund to help future counseling students meet their basic needs while completing the unpaid internship required to enter the profession." Joy recognized that for many students, especially those already working multiple jobs to afford housing, food, and transportation, that the unpaid requirement becomes an insurmountable obstacle. Moved by this unintended conflict, she noted, "We are losing brilliant, compassionate voices simply because they can't afford to work for free."

Prior to her own major gift commitment, Joy had made only one other gift to Arcadia, which she offered the year prior to help motivate others to action. As a recent graduate of the counseling program herself, she now operates her own financial therapy practice, a fact that may contribute to her sentiments on the purpose of wealth. At the conclusion of the gift agreement process, VP Bryant noted that "Joy was wonderfully thorough as she crafted the parameters of her support and absolutely joyful as she determined how she hoped her gift would make a significant difference in someone else's life." Further VP Bryant also said, "it was the first time in a long time that my work with a donor, bringing a vision to life, impacted me emotionally. It reminded me of why I have chosen philanthropic advising as my life's work," offered Bryant.

Joy's compassion for other students in the program was part of what she learned in her classroom at Arcadia from **Dr. Lauren E. Reid**. Joy completed the same program that she is now supporting and credits Dr. Reid as the gift's catalyst. To show her appreciation, Joy has added Dr. Reid's name to the fund and says, "I made this \$50,000 gift to the *Slabaugh/Reid Endowed Emergency Support Fund* because my hope is that this gift inspires others to follow in her footsteps, ensuring that our future mental health workforce mirrors the strength, resilience, and lived experiences of the communities they serve." Joy believes that "now more than ever, we need counselors whose basic needs are met — so they can show up with full presence, compassion, and courage." With Joy as a leading voice and with the support of other donors, Arcadia can break down the barriers and open the doors for those best positioned to lead people-centered healing in our communities.

GIVING WITH PRIDE

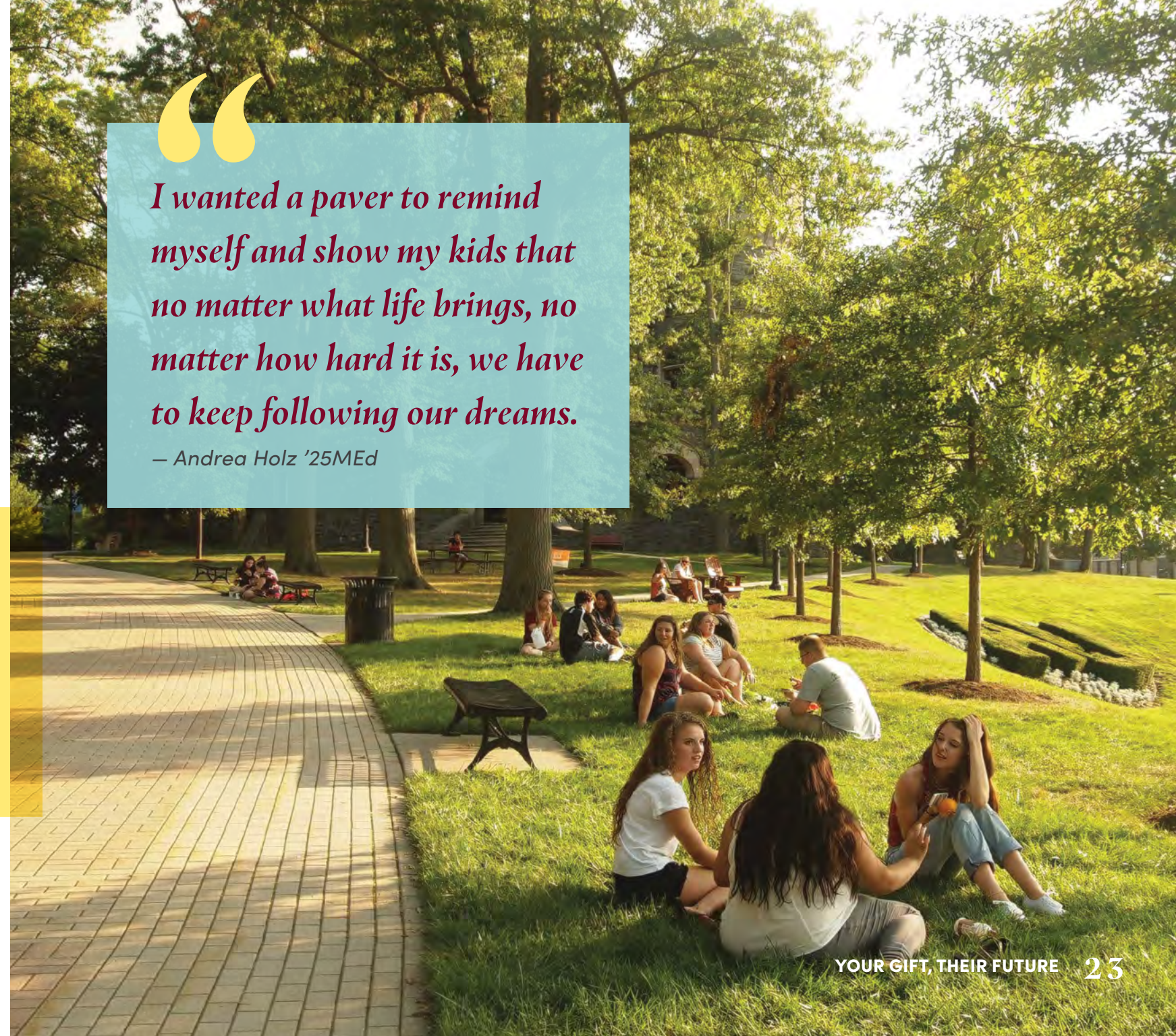

Honoring Mentorship Through Giving

To each person, giving differs. There are many ways for *Impact Philanthropy* to make its mark on Arcadia. Take the case of the late **Ruth Ma Fong '69** (September 2025). After her first gift in 1984, Ruth gave consecutively for many years before she paused her support. However, in April 2025, the culmination of her experience led to her decision to honor the legacy of a professor—**Dr. Arthur C. Breyer**—who she recalls had a great impact on her education. In an act of extraordinary philanthropic kindness, Ruth made a gift of \$50,000 to supplement the *Gates-Alyea-Breyer Award*, an endowed award named for Dr. Breyer and two other Beaver College professors. The award supports an outstanding undergraduate student, majoring in Chemistry, who demonstrates unusual potential for future graduate studies and who is seriously considering teaching as a career.

As she recalls the impetus for the gift, Ruth shares that she came to Beaver

College with not only no money but also an inability to speak English fluently because she attended a Chinese high school in Hong Kong. She found it difficult to assimilate. But Dr. Breyer, Professor Emeritus of Chemistry and Physics, “played a very important role in my life, and without his help, I would not have been able to finish my studies at Beaver College.”

Although Ruth was awarded a scholarship to attend Beaver College, there were other fees and books which were not covered. She recalls, “Dr. Breyer assisted me to get a work-study job in Taylor Hall, cleaning laboratory equipment. I remain sincerely thankful whenever he crosses my mind...what he did for me changed my life.” By bolstering the *Gates-Alyea-Breyer Award*, Ruth is extending the grace provided to her and establishing her own legacy of compassion, care, and resilience.

NURTURING A TRADITION OF DISCOVERY AND IMPACT

Local to Glenside, **Janet “Jan” Bullock Perper '51** (*right, below*) followed in the footsteps of her cousin, **Ruth Bell Wolfrom '42**, and her sister, **Shirley Bullock Adams '48**, to attend Beaver College. Jan received the Cheltenham Scholarship, which allowed her to attend the institution and major in Chemistry. Now at 95 years old, she remains extremely appreciative of the support and care she received at Beaver and relishes the opportunity to continue to support today’s Arcadia students. She recalls just how much her time at school “expanded her world with the education and knowledge she received.” Jan made her first donation to the University in 1957 and has since been an integral donor to *The Fund for Arcadia*.

At 50, she completed her Master of Science in Occupational Health at Temple University. Her career was spent as an industrial hygienist and running her own consulting business. Prior to that, she was an instructor at Temple University and a researcher at the Harvard School of Public Health and SmithKline Beecham. Jan was semi-retired and hoping to join the peace corps which unfortunately required a two-year commitment—a

stretch of time she didn’t want to spend out of the country as a new grandparent. But then she crossed paths with Arcadia Professor **Gail Hearn, PhD** (*right, above*) Dr. Hearn reached out to her with the opportunity of a lifetime: a part-time instructor role in Bioko (Island), Equatorial Guinea, Africa. The then new Arcadia Study Abroad course was offered in conservation biology in Bioko and included studying the island’s endangered primate population. By 72, Jan was a seasoned traveler and had touched ground on all seven continents, so she did not experience the typical culture shock that some might feel in a new country. While living on the island beaches with students, she quickly and got to work facilitating the program.

In addition to her role as resident director, Jan acted mainly as a behind-the-scenes facilitator, ensuring that classes and field trips went as smoothly as possible. She also thoroughly appreciated the opportunity to study conservation biology; this work allowed her to continue the relationship with the University and serve in an engaging role. When asked why she gives, Jan looks to provide the same resources she was once granted to succeed.



Beginning with Purpose and Promise



Susan Mountz '64 discovered herself at Beaver College. After receiving what she describes as a “fulfilling and life-changing education,” she decided to explore what opportunities she had to express her gratitude through both multi-year support and estate planning. In 2016, Susan established the *Susan Patt Mountz '64 Endowed Scholarship in International Peace and Conflict Resolution*. Inspired by the returning and incoming students, Susan decided, as part of her estate planning process, to include Arcadia, and have her donation designated to her existing endowed scholarship.

In her own words, Susan explains:
“As I look at the pictures online of members of the Arcadia Class of 2029

arriving on campus, I can’t help but remember my first days on the Beaver College campus in Jenkintown in 1960. As an 18-year-old from a small city in New York state, I was both anxious and excited to take this next step in my young life. While much has changed at the University over the past 65 years, some things remain the same and are the reasons I continue to support the institution every year and to include it in my estate planning.

“Attending a small college in an urban/suburban setting, I learned my way around the city of Philadelphia—the libraries, the art museums, the convention center, public transportation—all new experiences,

and a large part of my education. The close-knit classes, approachable professors at Arcadia, and my choice of a major in history and government helped me to develop an interest in understanding other cultures and governments. While study abroad was not an option back then, it is an amazing opportunity for Arcadia students today, and one of the reasons I choose to

support the University. Living and studying with students in other cultures can only help to foster peace and understanding around the world.

“While attending Beaver College, I made friends that have lasted a lifetime and began a relationship with my husband (then a student at F & M—at that time a men’s college) that has lasted 60 years.

“After graduation, I switched gears and returned to college to become a registered nurse and work in the field of community health. But I never lost my interest in peace and social justice, which I was first exposed to at Beaver College. When a University representative visited me on a trip through New England for the development office, we discussed how I might put my interests to work for Arcadia. “She encouraged me

to establish an endowed scholarship: *Susan Patt Mountz '64 Endowed Scholarship in International Peace and Conflict Resolution*, which I continue to support and is included in my estate planning. I am excited to imagine students taking advantage of the opportunities available to them to learn and work for a better world, and I am proud to give back to the University that first fostered that interest in me.”

REBUILDING HISTORY

The Gatehouse Arch has been part of Arcadia’s grounds since the construction of the Harrison Estate in the 1890s. Having graced campus for 129 years, it was removed in 2020 due to concerns regarding structural instability. Arcadia University obtained the necessary authorization to dismantle the Arch, hoping to restore it. Unfortunately, the projected restoration expenditure is approximately \$1M. In accordance with preservation principles, Arcadia has salvaged the components of the arch with plans to repurpose as much of the original materials as is feasible, thereby safeguarding the architectural integrity and historical weight of the monument.

The Gatehouse Arch has a significant iconic place at the University. It served as an entry point for students of Beaver College and Arcadia University. It remains an important part of the legacy of Beaver College and had been a visual symbol of our community identity—a landmark for Glenside and the surrounding communities. The Alumni House at Blankley Hall, which originally served as a welcome point for visitors, will be complete with the return of The Gatehouse Arch.

You’re invited to participate as we rebuild history stone by stone! Each stone (2,500 in total) will be \$400 for us to raise \$1M to restore this iconic symbol of our University. Please help us to restore Arcadia’s Gatehouse Arch.

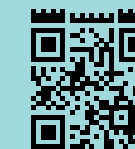
